### **CALL TO ORDER**

The Administrative Policy Committee conducted a meeting on Tuesday, October 28, 2025 at City Hall (Mayor's Conference Room), 1737 Main Street, Columbia, South Carolina 29201. The Honorable Edward H. McDowell, Jr., Chair called the meeting to order at 11:04 a.m. and the following members were present:

### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

- June 17, 2025 Administrative Policy Committee Meeting Minutes – *Approved*

Upon a motion made by Dr. Bussells and seconded by Mr. Brown, the Committee voted unanimously to approve the June 17, 2025 Administrative Policy Committee Meeting Minutes.

### **COMMITTEE DISCUSSION**

- Special Event Fees - Mr. Harold Reaves, Special Events Coordinator – *Endorsed for City Council Consideration*

Mr. Harold Reeves, Special Events Coordinator presented the current fee schedule for events and explained how the permitting process has been streamlined. He proposed eliminating fees for events hosted by neighborhood associations, which currently include a \$25 processing fee and a \$10 charge per barricade. The goal is to encourage more community gatherings and help residents enjoy the city together as neighbors.

There was discussion about private sector road closures for events; online applications; when fees should apply; public safety requirements; and changes to the fee schedule document.

There was consensus of the committee to endorse the staff recommendation to eliminate event fees for neighborhood associations for City Council consideration.

3. Honorary Street Naming Application in honor of Brian DeQuincey Newman – *Endorse for City Council Consideration*

Councilor McDowell reflected on the late Brian DeQuincey Newman, former City Council member who passed away in 2023 at the age of 40. Mr. Newman was instrumental in advancing the Bull Street Project. We have already spoken to the applicant, Mr. Hughes, along with the Director of Public Works, Mr. Robert Anderson and all necessary documentation has been submitted.

There was consensus of the committee to endorse the honorary street naming in honor of Brian DeQuincey Newman for City Council consideration.

4. Honorary Site Naming Application in honor of William Fincher – *Endorse for City Council Consideration*

Councilor McDowell spoke about the dedication of a park bench at Mays Park in honor of Mr. William P.H. Fincher, a longtime Columbia resident and contributor to the city's business community.

There was discussion about the successful development of Mays Park and creating a streamlined process for sponsoring or naming features within public parks.

There was consensus of the committee to endorse the placement of the bench for City Council consideration.

5. Honorary Site Naming Application in honor of Joyace and Don Jackson – *Endorse for City Council Consideration*

Mr. Russell Kelley, Columbia Literary and Jocular Society spoke in honor of Joyace and Don Jackson, both longtime members of the organization. Joyace Jackson was a Duke University dietician and Dr. Don Jackson was a respected ophthalmologist at the Columbia Eye Clinic. He expressed that the group wished to recognize the Jacksons for their lasting impact on the community.

There was consensus of the committee to endorse the placement of a plaque at the base of a tree at Saluda Riverwalk Park for City Council consideration.

6. Honorary Site Naming Application in honor of Annette H. Boette – *Endorse for City Council Consideration*

Dr. Bussells shared that honoree Annette H. Boette, who was a strong advocate for animal rights and a supporter of the Columbia Police Department's K-9 Team. Recognizing the need for protective vests for CPD dogs, she launched a grassroots initiative with friends to raise support. In partnership with the department, an inscribed bench will be purchased and installed at the Paw Path at Rosewood Park in her honor.

There was consensus of the committee to endorse placement of an inscribed bench at Rosewood Park for City Council consideration.

7. Design Development Review Commission Configuration - Ms. Lucinda Statler, Planning Administrator / Planning & Development Services Department – *Endorse for City Council Consideration*

Ms. Lucinda Statler, Planning Administrator reported that the Downtown Strategic Plan will take effect January 1, 2026. She explained that the plan recommends dividing the current Design / Development Review Commission into two bodies: the Urban Design Review Commission and the Historic Preservation Review Commission, to better manage workload and align with member expertise. Current members may apply to either board and continue their existing terms.

There was discussion about board composition; mutual exclusivity for case assignments; eligibility of terms; meeting dates; and term lengths.

There was consensus of the committee to endorse staff's recommendation to establish the two new commissions, advertise the positions, and forward to City Council for consideration.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:41 a.m.

Rosewood Elementary School in Columbia, South Carolina, has a rich history, serving the community for 100 years and playing a significant role in the fight for school desegregation. The Rosewood Neighborhood's robust history began with a school, built in 1926 to accommodate the surplus of mill family students. *According to The Moore Company*, back then, the last stop on Columbia's trolley was Rose Hill and the area was very rural.

Today, Rosewood Elementary is a small, neighborhood school located near the capital, the University of South Carolina, and the South Carolina State Fairgrounds. Rosewood students are exposed to world-class skills such as creativity and innovation through differentiated curriculum and instruction, language instruction in Spanish, and the infusion of visual arts, music, technology, and character education throughout the curriculum. Critical thinking and problem-solving are promoted at all grade levels through authentic and engaging learning experiences. Extracurricular activities include chorus, strings, German club, Fitness Team, and Run Hard.

Rosewood Elementary School prepares every student to be a successful, contributing citizen in a global society by providing an effective and high-quality education. Rosewood is a certified Arts in Basic Curriculum (ABC) School. The South Carolina Arts Commission funds ABC. We utilize an ABC grant to provide teacher development in integrating the arts into our curriculum to foster creativity and engagement. The ABC grant also funds integrated speakers and field studies that give Rosewood students real-world experiences.

Rosewood students annually display high academic performances. We utilize common formative assessments and analyze them continuously to match instruction to learners' needs, which will foster growth. We believe that early intervention is the key to long-term reading success.

Our school is fortunate to have many parents, local businesses, neighborhood associations, and community members who volunteer and participate in our school community through activities such as International Walk to School Day, Science Night, a Spring Picnic, and Rosewood Readers. Our parents' engagement and community support continue to enhance the school climate, promote student achievement, and contribute to our success.

In honor of our 100 years of service to the Rosewood community, we request the 200 Block of South Ravenel, between 3200 Hope Avenue and 3200 Rosewood have the honorary name of Eagle Way.

**Dear Rosewood Elementary School Community and Centennial Celebration Committee,**

**It is with great pride and heartfelt enthusiasm that I write this letter in support of the Centennial Celebration of Rosewood Elementary School, a school that holds a special place in my heart and has shaped the lives of four generations of my family. This milestone is not just a reflection of 100 years of excellence in education—it is a testament to the strength, dedication, and vision of a community that has worked tirelessly to create a nurturing environment where children can thrive.**

**Some say being traditional is mundane, but my commitment to this community is far from lackluster—it is at the core of who I am as an educator and a lifelong resident of Columbia. I am fortunate to call the Rosewood Community of Columbia my home, where my family has lived on the same two streets for four generations. My childhood home, built by my great-grandfather, stands on land where my great-grandparents operated a commercial greenhouse. Today, my husband and I live in the renovated home that once belonged to my grandparents, keeping family traditions alive while raising our own children in this same cherished community.**

**As a proud product of Richland County School District One, my journey in education began right here at Rosewood Elementary. I walked the same halls where my grandmother, a member of the first group of students welcomed by the newly constructed Rosewood in 1925, once studied. She spoke of 5th Avenue, the two-lane dirt road that would later become Rosewood Drive, and of the simple joys of learning in a school that was just beginning its long and storied history. My mother followed in her footsteps in the 1950s, sitting in perfectly lined desks with her post-war, baby-boomer classmates. The school expanded to meet the needs of a growing community and welcomed new friends as Rosewood was one of the first schools in Columbia to desegregate.**

**When I attended Rosewood in the 1980s, I vividly remember the excitement when First Lady Nancy Reagan visited during her “Just Say No” campaign. Later, as a Teacher Cadet at Dreher High School, I realized that teaching was my calling. Listening to my grandmother’s stories about teaching Latin at Dreher inspired me, and the outstanding educators at Rosewood, Hand, and Dreher fueled my desire to become an educator in my community. I have the unique privilege of teaching in the very district that nurtured me as a young learner.**


**Each morning when I unlock my classroom door, I reflect on my own educational journey and the generations of my family who have been shaped by this community. I am one of the fortunate few who can say that I have witnessed the morning sun rise from the same classroom I once sat in as a student. I can walk down the main hallway of Rosewood and see the faces of my family members in the historic panoramic school photos. Now, as a mother, I am proud that my three daughters also call Rosewood home, continuing our family’s deep-rooted connection to this school and to Richland One.**

**The story of Rosewood Elementary cannot be told without recognizing the extraordinary contributions of the Rosewood Parent-Teacher Association (PTA), whose dedication has been**

instrumental in bridging the gap between home and school. Since its formation in the 1929-30 school year, the Rosewood PTA has worked tirelessly to foster a collaborative relationship between parents and teachers, ensuring that the school thrives and that the children of Rosewood are prepared to become thoughtful, engaged citizens of tomorrow.

As we celebrate 100 years of excellence, I am honored to support this momentous occasion and to recognize the profound legacy of Rosewood Elementary School and the Rosewood PTA. This Centennial Celebration is not only a time to reflect on our shared history but also an opportunity to recommit ourselves to the future of this beloved institution. Therefore I hope you can join me in my support of the honorary street name change for the 200 block of South Ravenel from 3200 Rosewood to 3200 Hope Avenue. I am 100% invested in this community, and I am proud to stand with generations of families, educators, and students who have contributed to making Rosewood the extraordinary school it is today.




