Aligning State and Community Efforts for Health Improvement

Objective 1

- **Develop model for statewide, collaborative Community Health Needs Assessment/Community Health Improvement Plan model** that aligns hospitals, public health, and other community-based organizations (survey tool, focus group process, 1:1 interview model and other tools).

Objective 3

- **Build capacity** in SC by the development of a training strategy and model for spreading Results-Based Accountability.

Objective 4

- **Build framework in Clear Impact** for statewide dashboard to view and monitor progress on outcomes.

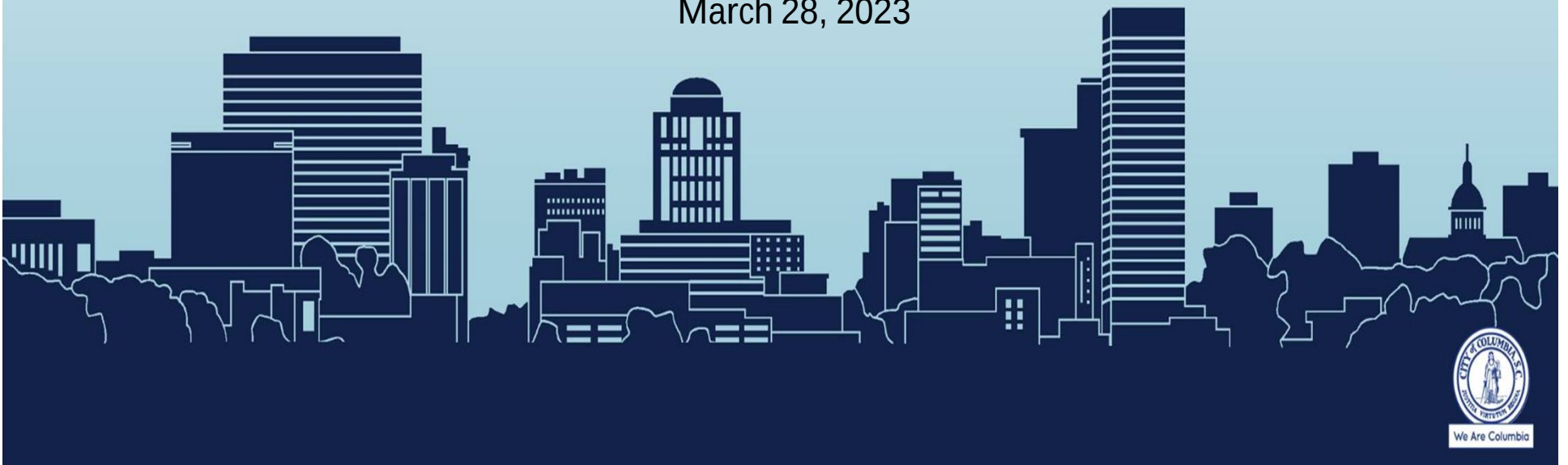

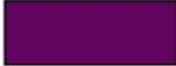

APWA Uniform Color Codes

	WHITE - Proposed Excavation
	PINK - Temporary Survey Markings
	RED - Electric Power Lines, Cables, Conduit, and Lighting Cables
	YELLOW - Gas, Oil, Petroleum, or Gaseous Materials
	ORANGE - Communication, Alarm, or Signal Lines, Cables or Conduit
	BLUE - Potable Water
	PURPLE - Reclaimed Water, Irrigation and Slurry Lines
	GREEN - Sewer and Drain Lines

SC Code of Laws Title 58 Chapter 36

Underground Facility Damage Prevention Act

- Creation of a notification center for underground excavation
- Utilities given 3 full working days after notification to mark utilities
- Paint markings must last 15 working days



SC Code of Laws Section 58-36-30

Underground Facility Damage Prevention Act

SECTION 58-36-30. Ordinances superseded and preempted; effect of permit on liability.

(A) The provisions in this chapter supersede and preempt any ordinance enacted by a local political subdivision that purports to:

(1) require operators to obtain permits from local governments in order to identify facilities;

(2) require pre-marking or marking of facilities;

(3) specify the types of paint or other marking devices that are used to identify facilities; or

(4) require removal of marks.

(B) A permit issued pursuant to law authorizing an excavation or demolition shall not be deemed to relieve a person from the responsibility for complying with the provisions of this chapter.

City of Columbia efforts

- City staff using water based marking paint
- Request other utilities to use water based paint when marking in City limits
