



COLUMBIA CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 2022

The Columbia City Council conducted a meeting on Tuesday, February 1, 2022 at City Hall, 1737 Main Street, 3rd Floor, Columbia, SC 29201. The Honorable Daniel J. Rickenmann, Mayor called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. and the following members of Council were present: The Honorable Howard E. Duvall, Jr., The Honorable Mayor Pro-Tempore Edward H. McDowell, Jr., The Honorable William Brennan, The Honorable Aditi Bussells, The Honorable Tina N. Herbert, and The Honorable Joe E. Taylor, Jr. Also present were Ms. Teresa Wilson, City Manager and Ms. Erika D. Moore Hammond, City Clerk. This meeting was advertised in accordance with the South Carolina Freedom of Information Act. *The minutes are numbered to coincide with the order of the meeting.*

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

INVOCATION

Mayor Rickenmann took a moment of personal privilege to observe the passing of Judge Mildred Weathers McDuffie. Judge McDuffie was an educator, a county council member, a magistrate judge, a mentor, and an activist during the Civil Rights movement. She has impacted so many lives. She was a trailblazer in the community and she leaves a huge legacy. A moment of silence was taken to honor the life of Judge Mildred Weathers McDuffie.

The Honorable Mayor Pro Tempore Edward H. McDowell, Jr. offered the invocation.

ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

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CITY COUNCIL DISCUSSION / ACTION

2. COVID-19 Situational Report - Mr. Harry Tinsley, Emergency Management Director

Mr. Harry Tinsley, Emergency Management Director said the South Carolina combined case count stands at 1,389,266. There have been 14,991,818 tests to date. There are 4,137 new confirmed cases with a 23.9% positivity rate. There are 26 new confirmed deaths and two probable deaths. The state's total combined deaths due to COVID-19 stands at 15,508. In Richland County, the confirmed case count stands at 91,955. There are 274 cases posted for today. There are 707 confirmed and 127 probable deaths to date. As of January 19th, Richland County's 14 – day recent disease activity incidence rate remains high. DHEC reports 6,596,626 doses of COVID-19 vaccines have been administered in South Carolina and as of January 29th approximately 53.1% of South Carolina's eligible population are fully vaccinated and 62.1% have received at least one vaccine dose.

Ms. Teresa Wilson, City Manager reported that 11% of the workforce is currently affected by COVID-19.

3. Introduction to Procurement and Contracts - Ms. Sandra A. Middleton, CPPB, Director/Purchasing Agent and Ms. Shannon S. Lizewski, CPPO, NIGP-CPP, Deputy Director for the Department of Procurement & Contracts

Ms. Sandra A. Middleton, CPPB, Director for the Department of Procurement & Contracts provided an overview of the department's basic information and processes used to procure bids. Any procurement activity at the City of Columbia is in accordance with the City's Procurement Code, Appendix G, and the State of South Carolina's Procurement Code and Regulations. Examples of frequently purchased goods and the types of contracts utilized for services was provided. Procurement thresholds include small procurements valued at less than \$5,000; informal procurements valued at \$5,001 to \$25,000; and formal procurement valued at over \$25,000. All city procurements valued at \$50,000 or more are forwarded to City Council for review and approval. Standard advertising processes are used for formal procurements. The most commonly used formalized procurement method is referred to as an invitation for bid (IFB), which is awarded to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder. Some other methods are: request for proposals (RFPs), request for qualifications (RFQs), request for information (RFIs), emergency procurements, and sole source procurements. The procurement cycle encompasses planning and determining needs, developing specs and scope of work, procurement method for sourcing, acquisition phase, negotiation and evaluation, selection and award, performance phase, and contracts administration.

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Ms. Shannon S. Lizewski, CPPO, NIGP-CPP, Deputy Director for the Department of Procurement and Contracts discussed the city's access to utilizing procurements and contracts released and awarded by other public entities to include State of South Carolina contracts, cooperative agreements, Western States Contracting Alliance, Sourcewell, National Cooperative Purchasing Alliance, Houston-Galveston Area Council (HGAC), and others. Indefinite delivery contracts were discussed in regards to the successes in the areas of unforeseen and urgent repair needs. The procurement package completion date for informal and formal procurements was defined. The average processing time for procurements is higher in the summer months and it levels out during the fall and winter.

Councilor Taylor asked when is the start date for procurements.

Ms. Shannon S. Lizewski, CPPO, NIGP-CPP, Deputy Director for the Department of Procurement and Contracts said the process starts by the end user putting the information into IFAS, then it goes to all of the required individuals for approval, and finally it comes to the buyer and that is when our clock starts.

Ms. Sandra A. Middleton, CPPB, Director for the Department of Procurement and Contracts said there are so many variables and that is why we wanted to go with the controlled part of the process where requests are in our queue. Our data is from the date it was dropped in the buyer's box to the date a purchase order was issued.

Mayor Rickenmann said we need to understand the process from start to finish to help us produce a more effective system. We need to figure out how we can become more efficient, effective, and quicker in getting things done throughout the process.

Councilor Herbert said we want to know which things only take two days and why these are easy. Also tell us what is taking a year and provide ideas or recommendations in regards to problems encountered. I am looking for the strengths and weakness of the process and a clarification of terms. This will help us see where we could potentially assist if there is something that we can help with.



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Ms. Shannon S. Lizewski, CPPO, NIGP-CPP, Deputy Director for the Department of Procurement and Contracts discussed all the challenges of the department to include supply chain disruptions, current market conditions, limited staffing, forecasting challenges, limited contractor/vendor pool availability, complexity and uniqueness of some projects, risk management, and the need for database updates. The current focus areas include improving overall customer service delivery to include response time, vendor database updates, updates to policies and procedures, and the contract management module.

Ms. Sandra A. Middleton, CPPB, Director for the Department of Procurement and Contracts said virtual meeting opportunities for contractors are very beneficial and time saving. The solicitation for the diversity study is another accomplishment, as well as the COVID-19 fulfillment center. We have also incorporated compliance information as a complete packet in all formal construction solicitations. One of the biggest accomplishments is the rollout of the Contracts Management Module (CMM) to assist with tracking city contracts issued through the Department of Procurement and Contracts. This module is a centralized repository for contracts, agreements, change orders and other pertinent contract information.

Mayor Rickenmann reiterated his concerns in regards to finding the most efficient and effective way in getting information out quickly. We ought to submit our questions to staff and have another opportunity to do a deeper dive because I do think it is time to evaluate the city's technology needs.

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Councilor Herbert said David did a great presentation on Thursday at the Columbia Council of Neighborhoods (CCN). I was very disappointed because many of the communities that have called me about this particular topic weren't at CCN. I scheduled another meeting last night and we met with about five neighbors and gave them the opportunity to truly understand the changes. We did a good job in conveying the message and getting the support of the community. The more we can help the community understand, it will help with implementation.

Mayor Rickenmann said one of the complaints of the system is that there is no ticket given to the tenant in the first violation if it's a rental property. The landlord automatically is given the first ticket. The landlord can't remedy a problem that the tenants are responsible for. Is there a process where the tenant is given responsibility for the first violation and the landlord gets a warning? Obviously if they're a repeat landlord, we have a different system for that. There is an imbalance in responsibility. How do we cure that before we finalize this?

Mr. David Hatcher, Housing Official for the Code Enforcement Division said when we start a case on a rental property that is within the realm of what the tenant would be responsible for, we send a notice to the tenant and to the landlord. We do rely on the tenant to abate those issues. The landlord still can get the assessed points because that is the way the ordinance is designed. The landlord gets the points but we do look to the tenant to address those issues. We do write summons to the tenants all the time. They automatically get the points because a case was started but that is why the ordinance allows for 15 points because we know there is going to be issues at properties and it gives the landlord opportunities to fix it.

Mayor Rickenmann said the complaints I have heard are in regards to nuisance complaints and other issues that are tenant driven. When we get into nuisances, it puts the landlords in a very unique position because the tenant is not getting the ticket. If we are going to have a system, there has to be some balance. When you have more than 52% of rental properties, this will become a bigger issue. I don't want to give a pass to a landlord, but there should be responsibility placed on the tenant in certain situations. A violation is five points, that is 30% without the landlord ever having the opportunity to place the responsibility on the tenant. The landlord can become a repeat offender. I am supportive of the ordinance for the most part, but it has unintended consequences that have not been addressed. I will reserve the right to amend this ordinance at a later date and ask that we send this to a committee to help in making sure we are addressing the issues correctly and fairly.

Ms. Teresa Wilson, City Manager said I am glad you all approved the ordinance in its totality today. I spent my morning deliberating over an issue out in Golden Acres that you may have seen in a news report last night. If we held this today it wouldn't have given us the authorization to make sure that this ten-year-old vehicle that has been sitting there as a public safety hazard is removed today. What you are doing is very critical.
